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
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### WELCOME TO HAMILTON

### HISTORY IN THE MAKING

Hamilton's history is a tale of beginnings, endings and evolutions, starring a host of rogues and rebels. The beginning came with the arrival of United Empire Loyalists - those supportive of the British monarchy - who saw the welcome mat disappear for them in the United States after the American Revolutionary War concluded in 1783. After the War of 1812, a gentleman named George Hamilton (no relation to the bronzed actor) bought land and named the area after himself. The roots for Hamilton - the city - were planted.

Those early years left Hamilton's cityscape with treasures like Dundurn Castle, The Lister Block, Hamilton Public Library building and Whitehern. At the beginning of the 20th century, a building and population boom began in earnest with immigrants chiefly from Britain and European nations such as Italy and Austria-Hungary. Along with it, diverse ethnic neighbourhoods sprang up and institutions of higher learning, like McMaster University, were born.

The industrious, hard-working nature of Hamilton also spawned an impressive list of sports stars, ranging from hockey's Dick Irvine to Olympic marathon gold medallist William (Billy) Sherring, and early Hollywood greats like Florence Lawrence (dubbed The First Movie Star) and Del Lord, director of the Three Stooges films. Hamilton-hosted advancements in medicine came courtesy of men like Harold E. Johns (who researched radiation's role in cancer treatment) and John Callaghan, a cardiologist who pioneered open-heart surgery.

The official incorporation of Hamilton came in 1846. As in real estate, it has always been about location, location, location. With a natural harbour linked to Lake Ontario, it was the perfect spot for industry to flourish. The city's reputation as Steeltown became entrenched in its fabric. In reality, the Hamilton of today employs more people in health care than industry. Education, government and technology businesses have also mixed things up and given the city a vibrant, new profile.



### **Bragging Rights**

By now, you've likely heard about the exodus of creative types from Toronto and beyond, lured to Hamilton by our burgeoning arts scene, not to mention an impressive stock of old houses — and studio spaces — at a third of the price of a similar property in Hogtown.

We're not ones to brag, but over the past couple of years, Hamilton has garnered an array of prestigious accolades including being voted the top place in Ontario to invest – for the second year in a row – by the Real Estate Investment Network of Canada. US-based *Site Selection* magazine also ranked Hamilton the #1 city in Canada for commercial and industrial development, beating

out Toronto and Quebec City, among others. Oh, and did we mention that Hamilton has also been ranked among the top cities in North America by *FDI Magazine* for quality of life?

Speaking of quality of life, and further testament to the popularity of arts and culture in Hamilton, is the fact that seven local events made the 2013 list of Ontario's Top 100 Festivals and Events, including Doors Open (May 4-5), the Re-enactment of the Battle of Stoney Creek (June 1-2), Canadian International Military Tattoo (June 8-9), Hamilton Airshow (June 15-16), It's Your Festival (June 28-July 1), Dundas Cactus Festival (Aug 17-18) and Telling Tales: A Family Festival of Stories (Sept 15).

Accolades aside, the best way to discover Hamilton is to visit Hamilton, so what are you waiting for? Turn the page and get discovering!

Carrying on the vision of her mom's store that opened in Tecumseh over 40 years ago, Ann Hanley Adams' tastefully designed boutique carries a well-curated selection of brands including Smythe, Theysken's Theory, Joie and Judith and Charles.



### **Hands & Feet Mint Textile Studio**

### 22 Wilson Street, Unit 7

Local designer Brittni Gazendam is crafting a line of naturally dyed and hand-sewn canvas and leather handbags under the label Hands & Feet. She strives to make objects that are both aesthetically beautiful and well-designed. Alongside seven of her colleagues, Brittni has formed a collective and opened Mint Textile Studio in the Sonic Unyon building.



### **Laura Tedesco Jewellery Design**

### 1-195 Locke Street South

For Laura Tedesco, jewellery design runs in the family. A third-generation jeweller, she trained with her father Dino Tedesco, the owner of Venetian Jewellers before travelling to Italy to study at the Gemological Institute of America. Through her custom design studio, she is helping others to create beautiful and meaningful pieces of their own.

line called Rare Specimens.

The 10-acre family-run lavender farm run by Kevin Beagle and and Abigail Payne features an adorable farm store with culinary delights like lavender-infused honey and shortbread. You'll also discover local and Canadian artisanal products from sachets to freshen your drawers, essential oils, pillow and body sprays, body wash and liquid hand soap. We love the French milled soap with lavender buds and honey.

### **264 King Street East**

Accoutrements is a shop to get lost in while you enjoy the beautiful products and setting. Nestled in the International Village, Judi McIntyre's shop found its place amongst a thriving community with over a century of history. The boutique is inspired by Judi's travels to Paris and features a lovely assortment of items to fill a home with character. "I am always in search of little luxuries to make my life and others around me richer and more fulfilled." Judi tells us.



### **Pure Home Couture**

### 174 Locke Street South

Walk into Pure Home Couture and your imagination will easily transport you to old world Paris. Abby Karak-McDuffee and Steven McDuffee pay special attention to detail and ensure the shop makes a grand impression with high wood-beamed ceilings and gorgeous chandeliers. Antique tables and French armoires refinished by Abby, are each filled with a different line of products ranging from jewellery and beauty to dishware and linens. Expanding on their brand, Abby is even handcrafting the shop's own line of apothecary sea salts, liquid soaps, milk bath soaks and candles.

### Ellënoire

### 53A King Street West

Scent is unique to an individual, and perfumer Noëlle Smith makes fragrances from all-natural, custom blends to match your skin chemistry. Shelves are lined with jars containing everything from lemon peel to fir balsam, so you can mix and match natural oils and concentrates to craft your own custom scent. "Many artificial fragrances do not have very good quality ingredients," explained Noëlle. "They don't blossom on the skin like natural ingredients do."

### Hamilton's top art destinations

### Design Annex 118 James Street North

The Art Gallery of Hamilton's new space is a combination of an art and design store and venue. Offering an approachable atmosphere for art lovers to begin building their collections at affordable prices, they also showcase furnishings, lighting and accessories by Canadian artisans like Brothers Dressler, Broe & Co. and Nicole Tarasick.

### Nathanial Hughson Gallery 27 John Street North

Representing emerging contemporary and mid-career artists like David Hind, Stephanie Vegh and Ryan Price, the gallery is a destination for collectors looking to acquire unique works.

### Earls Court Gallery 215 Ottawa Street North

Established in 1973 as a print and framing gallery on George Street, the newest 1,600 sq ft gallery and 1,000 sq ft framing facility on Ottawa Street features historical works and local artists such as Ron Eady, Bill Schwartz and Nick Chase.

### 270 Sherman

Located in lower Hamilton, this arts centre has been transformed from a 1900-era industrial cotton mill into a creative complex for galleries, workshops and studios of 50 tenants including Jason Freiburger, Stephanie Seagram and Steve Mazza.

### Manta Contemporary 51 King William

Located amongst historic storefronts on King William, Manta strives to foster creative growth in Hamilton by offering emerging and established artists a space to show their work. Artists featured include Tara Krebs, Stephen Seguin and Paul Dickens.



### 159 John Street South

One of Hamilton's best-kept secrets, Tucker Plus opened in 1930 in the Lister Block. Pat Lisson, the present owner, worked for Mr. Tucker until he passed and has owned the John Street location since 1978. Throughout the shop you'll find antique collectibles, typewriters and furniture, alongside new calligraphy pens and Lamy fountain pens. You will also discover a unique collection of books with inscriptions on their front pages noting dates like 'Christmas 1940.'



### **Mixed Media**

### 154 James Street North

Located in a century-old building on the corner of James Street North and Cannon Street, the art supply and paper shop boasts hardwood floors, original tin ceilings and exposed brick beams. "Teresa and I first opened in rented premises at 174 right across from The Print Studio," explained owner Dave Kuruc. "Back then you could count on one hand the art spaces that were located here." Catalysts behind the ongoing revitalization of the James Street North neighbourhood, Mixed Media features a local artist each month and Kuruc is also the publisher of H Mag.

### Needlework

### 174 James Street North

Kate Hunter and Liz Simpson's shop has become a home base for Hamilton's craft community. "We want to be here to foster Hamilton's craft scene and help it grow by creating a space where craft-loving individuals can get together in an environment that supports shared learning, resource and skills," says Liz. Crafting in a space with beautiful fabric is a plus, especially when you are surrounded by fabrics by Cloud 9, Amy Butler, Anna Maria Horner and Heather Moore.



### **Hansen & Lübbers**

### 144 James Street North

Residing in what was originally part of Firth Brothers store, where Norman F. Firth began his clothing business, Hansen & Lübbers offers a wide range of furniture, accent pieces and accessories including the GUS\* furniture line. The shop also carries environmentally conscious paints and wallpapers by Farrow & Ball and the lower level houses a sewing workroom for drapery, slipcover and light upholstery services. Owners Richard and Craig are great art enthusiasts (and own a jaw-dropping collection, too), so each month the shop features the work of a different local artist.



### **Humblepie Lifestyle**

### 142 James Street North

Combining her love of art and vintage, with her commitment to environmental sustainability, Susan Edwards opened Humblepie Lifestyle as an upcycling concept store. Featuring locally made treasures, vintage finds and upcycled pieces from post-consumer materials, Susan is passionate about repurposing furniture and products in a creative and sustainable fashion. Humblepie also offers workshops and styling services for introducing vintage pieces to your home.

## Home Decor & Antiques





### Lulu & Lavigne

### 228 Locke Street South

A sign hanging near the entrance at Lulu & Lavigne reads: 'A home is not meant to be finished; it should evolve and be enjoyed.' Featuring a unique selection of new and vintage home furnishings and decor items, the pieces Heather Coward carries will lend well to a space that is uniquely yours. "Find something that you love and save up to buy it," suggests Heather. "Chances are it will be an investment piece that you will carry with you for a very long time no matter where you live."

### **Antique Avenue**

When Tom Watson and his business partner Adam Hughes purchased an entire lot of collectibles from a gentleman who had been collecting over the course of 30 years, Antique Avenue was born. A vintage lover's dream, you are likely to find anything you have ever imagined looking for, from Singer sewing machines, to first edition books, mason and milk jars; even a vintage Vespa from 1969. And if you're willing to hunt, they always have tons of treasures that have yet to be unpacked.

The retail studio of Charles MacIntosh and Alex Dejong, Branch Design gives potential clients a chance to browse home decor pieces, indoor and outdoor furnishings, art and gifts, all the while getting a taste of the design services Charles offers. "I love the idea of people being able to access design services, inspiration and home decor items in one location," says Charles. Sure to inspire decorating ideas, many of the shop's treasures are made by local artisans like the Italian marble birdhouses and clementine crates made by R&D Fabbricati and the family measurement charts crafted by Mike Meiler Woodworking.

### Where to Eat



### Hamilton's top Bars & Pubs

### The Ship 23 Augusta Street

The eclectic menu and nautical motif has made The Ship a favourite spot among locals. Owner Tate Graham offers a rotating selection of independent and craft brewed beers and has recently launched his own brew. On the menu you'll find Mexican fish tacos, popcorn alligator and classics like halibut and chips.

### **Thirsty Cactus** 2 King Street East

The Thirsty Cactus occupies a building at the corner of King and Main that has been around since 1840. If you like Mexican food, the portions are huge and they make their own salsa and guacamole in-house. Plus they smoke their own beef and pork. In addition to the domestic and imported beers, they offer a selection of margaritas and cocktails de la casa.

### The Brain

in the heart of James North, The Brain is the unique vision of owners Jeremy Greenspan (frontman of the electronica duo Junior Boys), Heather South and Brad Chichakian. With a love for local micro-breweries, they draw a discerning clientele with their unique selection of craft beers.

### **Baltimore House 43 King William Street**

This café-lounge-wine bar-art venue-social club is the kind of place to read, write, enjoy an espresso and have smart conversation by day. It then transitions into a social spot at night. Grant Winestock and Jimmy Skembaris' venture has attracted Hamilton's ever-growing literary, artistic and musically inclined crowd with their selection of vintage cocktails and authentic absinthe.

### **Cake & Loaf**

### **321 Dundurn Street South**

When your bread options include cheddar, onion and beer, or whole wheat pumpkin seed loaf, it's no surprise the loaves literally fly off the shelves. The products contain all locally sourced ingredients, in an effort to sustain Ontario's farmlands and support local farmers. Cake & Loaf offers a wonderful selection of lunch options including soups, sandwiches, vegan mini pizzas and braided loaves. And be sure to try the apple pear cider soda.

### 282 James Street North

Shane McCartney has offered a fresh approach to the salad bar experience and will be certain to change the way you think of fast food. Using healthy, locally sourced ingredients - buns come from Ola Bakery, cheese from Jensen - in his sandwiches, soups and salads, you'll see that you can eat healthy on the go and still enjoy the taste of wholesome natural foods.



### **Chuck's Burger Bar**

### 194 Locke Street South

Chuck's serves up some of the best burgers you'll ever taste. "All of our burgers are made from meat from local farms," says owner Chris. "They're handmade, hand ground, fresh to order." If you're looking for a veggie option, you are in for a treat. Not your traditional soy-based burger, the veggie patties are made from roasted turnips, carrots, parsnips, mushrooms, onions, zucchini, garlic, potatoes and vegetable stock.



### NàRoma Pizza Bar

### 215 Locke Street South

Using slow, time-honoured methods, Mario Spina makes authentic Italian pizza. And it's a very labour-intensive process. "The dough process is a 72-hour rising method," explains Mario. "The secret is time." We recommend you try the brie e prosciutto – a blend of mozzarella, triple cream brie cheese, prosciutto, fig jam, caramelized onions, arugula and reduced balsamic. And don't miss the made-from-scratch daily soups and homemade cannoli.



### Papa Leo's

### **638 Concession Street**

Leo's reason for choosing the spot was simple; it's in the neighbourhood he calls home. "I wanted to create that local place that I felt was missing from the area," says Leo. He describes his restaurant as a brunch bistro, with a Portuguese, Costa Rican and West Coast flair. If you love chorizo sausage give Papa's Eggs a try: two poached eggs on fresh avocado with either sweet chorizo sausage, smoked salmon or bacon, pan-fried potatoes and a cilantro cream sauce.

### **Mulberry Coffeehouse**

### 193 James Street North Located in the existing Hotel Hamilton building, the coffeehouse is bustling from the early hours of the morning to night. The space is inviting; airy with beautiful natural light streaming in, exposed brick walls adorned with the work of local artists, the aroma of fresh baked goods and brewed coffee. You can see the attention to detail and thought that went into designing it. "We wanted to maintain the integrity of the building and respect for its age and character," says Ella Sheppard. ### Battlefield House Museum & Park

Cozy and quiet Stoney Creek makes an appearance in the history books. This present-day Hamilton 'burb was the site of the Battle of Stoney Creek during the War of 1812, and is considered a turning point in the defence of what was then Upper Canada. When 3,000 American forces invaded the area on June 5 1813, 700 British soldiers retaliated the next morning before sunrise. Lasting less than 45 minutes, the bloodshed was great on both sides, but the battle was won by the British when

they eventually captured the two senior American officers. The victory was pivotal in ensuring that Upper Canada's existence would not be threatened further until it expanded to become the Province of Canada in 1841 and, eventually, Canada in 1867. The Battlefield House Museum & Park commemorates the battle's bicentennial with historical demonstrations, including settlers and soldiers, one-of-a-kind merchants and the dramatic re-enactment of the brief battle that changed the course of this nation's history.

### **Doors Open Hamilton**

Get out those walking shoes, plan your visits, then explore Hamilton's amazing architecture with open arms. As part of the Ontario Heritage Trust's provincial-wide initiative, Doors Open Hamilton opens the doors to many of Hamilton's landmark buildings to the public for free! Always the first weekend of May, this annual event celebrates the

rich architecture, heritage and culture of our city. Doors Open traces its roots to European Heritage Days, or Doors Open Days. The earliest events were held in France (1984), The Netherlands (1987) and Scotland (1990). Today, there are hundreds of Doors Open programs worldwide. Hamilton's began in 2003. Check website for time and locations. Free. doorsopenhamilton.ca.

### **Places of Worship**

When it comes to impressive century-old churches, Hamilton has much to be proud of. With more than 50 churches in the city, these historic buildings are not just places of worship; they are Hamilton's cultural heritage and prominent landmark buildings. Many are located just a stone's throw away from the city's hotspots. Walking along James St. South to the Hamilton GO Centre, you will see the English Gothic style St. Paul's Presbyterian Church and its 180-foot spire - one of the few remaining

in Canada. Located in the heart of downtown at 116 MacNab St. South, the MacNab Presbyterian Church, with its foundation stone laid by Isaac Buchanan, was built from whirlpool limestone by Scottish stonemasons in 1856-1857. The McQuesten family of Whitehern had been known to attend this church. Go west to 262 Middletown Road, Dundas to visit the West Flamboro Presbyterian Church, one of the first stone buildings erected in Christie's Corners. Its congregation, formed in 1832, just celebrated its 180th anniversary.





In 1874, The Hamilton Street Railway (HSR) began offering horsedrawn public transportation, lasting until 1892.



Sir Allan MacNab completed Dundurn Castle in 1835. Construction took three years to complete.



In 1878, the first telephone exchange in the British Empire was opened in Hamilton by **Hugh Cossart Baker.** 

### **Our History & Heritage**

Hamilton has its modern origins in and around the War of 1812, and luckily many testaments to this rich past are still standing today. A great place to start is Dundurn Castle (610 York Blvd.), the home of Sir Allan Napier MacNab, Premier of the United Canadas from 1854-56. Originally the site of a British Military outpost during the War of 1812, MacNab incorporated elements of the fortified supply depot when he built his home in 1830. Today, the prominent Victorian-era home has been restored to its state in the mid-1800s and is brought to life by costumed guides. Another part of Hamilton's history is Whitehern Historic House

& Garden (41 Jackson St.), an impressive estate that was home to the McQuesten family and retains many of their original possessions, spanning the Georgian, Victorian and Edwardian eras. There is also Battlefield House (77 King St. W.), which was built in 1796 and stood through the Battle of Stoney Creek, where the British won a decisive victory defending Upper Canada from the Americans. Finally, be sure to make the trip to the Westfield Heritage Village (1049 Kirkwall Rd.), a collection of over 30 historical buildings which have been carefully restored and populated with costumed interpreters who provide a glimpse into early Canadian culture.



### **Canadian Warplane Heritage Museum**

Ever wanted to climb into the cockpit of a 15,800 lb jetfighter? Or perhaps you're a history buff who just wants to learn more about Canadian military aircraft? Either way you can get up close and personal with an impressive selection of genuine military aircraft at the Canadian Warplane Heritage Museum. As the premier Canadian aviation museum, it houses 36 vintage and modern military planes. The museum offers guided tours, flight simulators and boasts at least 4,000 books, a few thousand periodicals and artifacts ranging from antique aircraft parts and medals to pilot log books. Did we mention that the museum is

the proud owner of a World War II Allied bomber, the Avro Lancaster; it's one of the last two in the world that is still in flying condition. Keep an eye out for the annual Hamilton Airshow (June 15-16) for magnificent displays of iconic warplanes. Located at the Hamilton International Airport. Open all year round 9am to 5pm. Learn more at warplane.com.



was home to a decisive English victory which kept the Americans from gaining a foothold in what was then Upper Canada, so it's no surprise that evidence of the war can be found all over the area. One of the more interesting examples are the shipwrecks of the Hamilton and the Scourge. Merchant schooners, pressed into service and outfitted with heavy artillery, both sank in a sudden squall just after midnight on August 8, 1813. The ships currently sit upright and intact 90 metres (300 feet) beneath the surface of Lake Ontario. The wrecks have been visited by diving expeditions from around the world, including a visit from famous

explorer Jacques Cousteau in 1980. A memorial plaque was erected in Confederation Park to commemorate the ships and the unique glimpse they provide into the military and social life of early 19th-century Canada. On September 21, 2013 a memorial service will be held to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the sinking of the Hamilton and the Scourge, as well as to honour the 53 sailors who lost their lives. Our favourite is their "Hamilton's Dark History Walk," which examines the city's criminal past and visits the sites of cold-blooded mob hits, executions and other examples of murder most foul, including the notorious Evelyn Dick, who is said to have killed her husband. In September, the City will also recognize the loss of some 53 seamen in the sinking of the *Hamilton* & *Scourge* in August 1813, that today, rest under 300 feet of water in Lake Ontario.

Also, in 1912, the 100-foot-high Battlefield Monument was unveiled to commemorate 100 years of peace between Canada and the United States.

Smith's Knoll Monument is a moving memorial to the fallen four Nations soldiers during the Battle of Stoney Creek.

Our War of 1812 heritage is rich, and the number of commemorative events will help tell many different stories:

- Nationalism and divided loyalties
- · Suffering and sacrifice
- But most importantly, 200 years of peace and cooperation between two nations.

Those stories are being told here in Hamilton.



If there's any year to visit this historic landmark, 2013 is it — this year marks the 200th anniversary of the Battle of Stoney Creek during the War of 1812. It was on this very spot in June 1813 that the battle took place, and history has been preserved at this Georgian colonial home built in 1796, at the base of the Niagara Escarpment. Battlefield House stands not far from a 1913 monument commemorating a century of peace with the United States. Stroll the 32-acre grounds (which connect to the Bruce Trail) or tour the home. The bicentennial events include a ceremony to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Battlefield Monument (May 31) and battle re-enactments (Jun 1, 3:30pm, 8:30pm and Jun 2, 2pm). Admission fee includes a wristband which allows unlimited re-entry to the event on Sat and Sun. Adults \$10, youths \$5, children 5 and under free. Also visit during autumn for the harvest-themed Apple Festival or during the holiday season to experience Christmas as it was in Upper Canada during the 1830s. Open year-round from Tue-Sun 12-4pm. Built in 1933, this stately limestone cathedral is an impressive visual signature. Its Gothic bell tower, patterned after the Cathedral of Notre-Dame's Tour de Beurre, stands 165 feet tall from the cornerstone (which was excavated from the Roman catacombs of St. Pamphilus) to the seven-foot bronze cross that caps the structure. The bells ring and doors open for mass Sat 9am and 5pm, Sun 11am and 4pm and Tues-Fri 8am at the Marian Chapel.

### Crooks' Hollow

This settlement bordering Spencer's Creek was established in 1813 by ambitious Scottish industrialist James Crooks. Though the ruins of the settlement are at best a faint outline, it once included a variety of mills (including Ontario's first paper mill), distillery, cooperage, tannery, clothing factory, foundry, general store and inn. The original stone grist mill operated until 1934, when it was razed by fire. The Hamilton Conservation Authority owns and manages several properties in the area, where a self-guiding trail winds past the settlement ruins.

For decades, this 100-hectare estate was home to the family of George Gordon Browne Leith (son of a Scottish baronet) and their servants. The Hermitage burned almost completely in October 1934, but Leith's daughter built a small home inside the ruins where she lived until her death in 1942. The Gatehouse was built around this time and it now serves as a museum, paying tribute to the family and their magnificent estate, the ruins of which have garnered attention from both historians and paranormal buffs. The Hermitage ruins have been stabilized by the Hamilton Conservation Authority and are interpreted to the public at the gatehouse museum which displays artifacts and a model of the mansion from the 1865 era. A National Historic Site of Canada, the HMCS Haida is a prime example of the Tribal Class destroyers built for the Royal Canadian Navy, the Royal Navy and the Royal Australian Navy in the World War II period. Commissioned into the Royal Canadian Navy in 1943, the Haida served in many theatres of operation through WWII and, after a post-war refit, through Korean War and Cold War situations until she was decommissioned in 1963. History comes alive as visitors experience how sailors lived, worked and fought aboard Canada's most famous warship. Visitors are invited to explore all 377 feet of this heroic ship (including mess decks, guns, Captain's cabin and bridge) on a self-guided tour. 



### **AGH World Film Festival**


Since its inception in 2009, The Art Gallery of Hamilton's World Film Festival has become an important event in Hamilton's

### Hamilton TiCats Still Eatin' 'Em Raw...but in Guelph!

Don't let the temporary jump to Guelph fool you — the Tabbies are STILL Hamilton's hometown heroes and a roaring force in the CFL. Ivor Wynne Stadium, the team's previous home, is undergoing a massive transformation and will be a world-class facility in time for the 2015 Pan Am Games, which means the Tiger-Cats will play out their 2013 season just up Hwy 6 in Guelph — a stone's throw away at 17 minutes from Hamilton's northern border. The 15-time

Grey Cup champions still have the city chanting "oskee-wee-wee", the team's battle-cry since 1869, and Guelph's Alumni Stadium welcomes the Cats and their fans this year with new artificial turf, a sophisticated lighting system and a state-of-the-art scoreboard. Put on your game face and show your stripes in support of the team. Yes, it's true - Ivor Wynne was the team's home-turf hunting field all the way back to 1950. So we're curious if the venue switcheroo can fetch our boys another Grey Cup win. But then again, curiosity killed the ... actually, never mind.


An American sportswriter once referred to golf as "a passion, an obsession, a romance...a nice acquaintanceship with trees, sand and water." If reading that evokes similar utopian sentiments about the sport, you'll be well served in Hamilton. The city is home to a fair number of private clubs for the ardent golfer, but for those who approach the game a little more casually, Hamilton is festooned with no less than three public courses when you're looking to practice your swing. In the west end of

the lower city, Chedoke Civic Golf Club boasts two golfing terrains, the Martin and Beddoe courses. Both located amidst a sweeping landscape, these 18-hole courses are perfect for the professional or amateur putter. At the other end of town you'll find King's Forest Golf Course, nestled at the foot of the Niagara Escarpment. Ranked in 2010 by SCOREGolf magazine as a top public course in Canada, the facility's classic yet strategic design make this a course that demands top concentration, which its natural setting lends itself easily to. Did someone just yell "fore"?

### **A City of Waterfalls**

Bet you didn't know that Hamilton is the waterfall capital of the world?! Not only are we the self-proclaimed 'City of Waterfalls,' but this picturesque city boasts over 126 of these flowing beauties. From the scenic Webster's Falls to the oh-so-stunning cascading Albion Falls, they are sure to stir the hearts of nature lovers and in-

curable romantics alike. The Devil's Punchbowl – a 37 metre ribbon waterfall – is another impressive sight not to be missed. At night, selected waterfalls are illuminated on special occasions – in fact, the first ever livestreamed online illumination was at Sherman Falls this past St. Paddy's Day. ### **GREAT OUTDOORS**

### **Hamilton Conservation Authority**

The HCA's 4,200 hectares of protected land stretch from the harbour to the escarpment. Two dozen environmentally significant conservation areas offer local city dwellers escape from the concrete jungle. Hiking, cross-country skiing, camping, fishing, boating, swimming or taking in the nature trails and historical sites are just a few ways to enjoy the area's recreational facilities. Valens Lake (RR 97 west of Hwy 6, Flamborough, 905.525.2183) is the site of 220 camping spaces along Spencer Creek; campsites are open 11 months of the year. Ponds are stocked with pike, panfish and bass from the last Saturday of June. One of the warmest and cleanest beaches on western Lake Ontario, Fifty Point (Fifty Rd. and the QEW. Stoney Creek, 905.525.2187) is home to an 80-hectare park. The beach and picnic grounds complement its 320-boat marina and fully serviced docking station. Part of a vast glacial valley spreading out into Lake Ontario, Dundas Valley's (Governors Rd., Dundas, 905.627.1233) five trails access almost every part of this conservation area. A replica Victorian train station, the trail centre connects the winding trails, providing visitors with interpretive displays, valley maps and a food concession (open Mon-Fri 8am-3pm, Sat, Sun, Hol Mon 8am-4pm). With 40 km of well-groomed trails, the route is one of the region's most significant routes for walking, cycling and horseback riding, and home to historical sites, including the Ancaster Hermitage ruins and Griffin House. Picturesque Spencer Gorge (Webster's Falls Rd., Greensville, 905.628.3060) also showcases views of Dundas and Hamilton and the biologically rich forests below. Containing more than 500 different plants and several rare species, visit one of the several lookout points for a glimpse of its curtain waterfall, Webster's Falls, or the 41-metre ribbon waterfall Tews Falls, which is just a few metres shorter than Niagara Falls. Bordering the table lands owned by the Royal Botanical Gardens at Rock Chapel above the escarpment, Borer's Falls (Rock Chapel Rd., Dundas, 905.627.1233) provides visitors with a world of forested land and trails to explore. Follow the 4.2 km promenade along the Hamilton Beach Trail from Confederation Park (Van Wagners Beach Rd., Stoney Creek, 1.800.555.8775) to the Burlington Ship Canal. Christie Lake (Hwy 5, West of Hwy 6, Dundas, 905.628.3060) offers a range of recreational activities across a 336-hectare conservation area. Paddleboat and canoe rentals and covered picnic pavilions are among the site's attractions, as well as its expansive 360-metre beach and swimming area. The Eramosa Karst (Upper Mount Albion Rd. at Highland Rd., Stoney Creek), the HCA's newest conservation area, is located in the southwestern section of Stoney Creek. Karsts are geological formations including underground drainage, caves and passages caused by dissolving rock found in limestone formations such as the Niagara Escarpment. The Eramosa Karst contains examples of 16 different karst features, including sinking streams and a 335-metre-long cave (the tenth longest in Ontario).

### Cootes Paradise Sanctuary

Nestled at the westernmost tip of Lake Ontario, just minutes from the heart of the city, Cootes Paradise is managed and protected by the neighbouring Royal Botanical Gardens. The 540-hectare Carolinian forest and wetland reserve provides visitors with a look at the abundant ecosystem of indigenous waterfowl, including more than 250 species of migrating birds, fish and aquatic plants. Native and endangered fish can be seen at the Great Lakes' first two-way fishway. A variety of species pass through the area, including double crested cormorants, great blue herons, white pelicans, great egrets and more. Bald eagles have also overwintered here in recent years; their nest (in a solitary white pine) is located on the north shore, about 400m west of the Marshwalk Observation Platform. Home to some of Canada's oldest forests, Cootes offers hiking trails in the Hamilton Harbour Waterfront and Desjardins Trails, and Princess Point is the perfect spot to paddle your kayak.

### Beamer Memorial Conservation Area

Just east of the Devil's Punchbowl, Beamer Memorial Conservation Area encompasses 53 hectares of protected escarpment land and mature forests. The conservation area is monitored to preserve the diverse vegetation, wildlife and valley. A water discharge area for the Forty Mile Creek system, the valley promotes the sustainability for a variety of species, including reptiles, amphibians, small mammals and many resident migratory birds. Each year an average of 15,000 hawks, eagles, falcons and vultures make their way from South and Central America, the Caribbean and the southern United States to their nesting territories in Canada during their spring migration at Beamer Memorial (Mar-May). Along the park's nature trails, the Bruce Trail leads to four lookouts offering a view of Lake Ontario and the Town of Grimsby below, and exceptional vantage points for observing the annual hawk migration. Open year-round 8am-8pm daily.

### African Lion Safari

Animal lovers come here to get closer than they ever imagined to the thousand-plus animals that roam free in the open wildlife reserves. In keeping with the park's name, visitors get a taste of the Sahara,

driving their cars through the park or taking an educational tour aboard the Safari Bus and cruising the waters aboard the African Queen. Of the 132 species of exotic animals that call the Safari home, including lions, elephants, rhinos, giraffe, ostrich and baboons, the park has bred 20 different endangered and threatened species. Wildlife shows such as the birds-of-prey flying demonstration and elephant roundup, provide further entertainment, while kids can hand-feed little animals at Pets' Corner. Take a trip on the Nature Boy scenic railway and have fun in Misumu Bay Wet Play Area and Jungle Playground. Gift Shops and picnic areas are on-site, or you can dine in the licensed Mombasa Market restaurant, Summer admission rates (May 18-Sep 2): adults (13+) \$32.95, seniors (60+) \$30.95, children (3-12) \$25.95. HST not included. Prices subject to change without notice. All features weather permitting. No pets allowed.



Guided tours Sundays 1-4pm.

### Lake Ontario Waterfront Trail

The site of 37 annual waterfront festivals, the 730 km Lake Ontario Waterfront Trail stretches along the shore of the Great Lake and the St. Lawrence River from Niagara to Quebec. Opened in 1995, the trail passes through 182 parks and conservation areas, 170 marinas and yacht clubs and 31 cities, towns and villages. Visitors can bike, blade or stroll along the path, while they take in the Golden Horseshoe's his-

tory and natural environment. The local beachfront link, the Breezeway Trail, connects Lakeland Pool, Confederation Park, Wild Waterworks and touches on Van Wagners Beach, bordered by Lake Ontario to the north and green spaces and wetlands to the south. True to its name, the newly completed 200-metre Waterfront Link Pedestrian Bridge (Van Wagners Beach Rd. at Nash Rd. N.) connects the Waterfront Trail to the Bruce Trail through the Red Hill Valley Trail. The Waterfront Trail links to New York State's 730 km span of the Seaway Trail at Wolfe Island in Kingston. By 2014, the Waterfront Trail will connect to Windsor along Lake Erie's waterfront, creating 1,400 km of amazing walking and cycling along two Great Lakes.

### Hamilton to Brantford Rail Trail

Canada's first fully developed, multi-use, inter-urban system, this 32 km trail is a joint operation under the Hamilton Conservation Authority (HCA) and Grand River Conservation Authority. Running from Ewen Road in west Hamilton through the Dundas Valley Conservation Area and on to Brantford, it's part of the Trans-Canada Trail Network, linking to Paris and Cambridge for a total length of 80 km. Rural areas provide a trail for equestrians, hikers, runners and cyclists. Access at West Hamilton: exit Hwy 403 at Main St. W., follow Main W. to Ewen Rd. and turn left (south).

### Lafarge 2000 Trail

Born with the new millennium, the Hamilton Conservation Authority (HCA) created this 22 km trail in Flamborough, linking Dundas Valley, Christie Lake, Valens Conservation Area and the ecologically important Beverly Swamp, a 2,400-hectare area that features a rich diversity of plant and animal life, including some species that are rare to the region.

### Dofasco 2000 Trail

This 11.5 km trail runs from the Devil's Punch Bowl Conservation Area through to the Vinemount South Swamp. The trail will eventually connect to the Bruce Trail, 1812 Battlefield House Museum and Waterfront

Trail at Fifty Point Conservation Area and Marina on Lake Ontario. Another "on-road" link will make the connection to the Chippewa Trail which is now designated a part of the Trans-Canada Trail network.

### Chippewa Trail

A former rail corridor that connected Hamilton and Caledonia, the abandoned 15 km strip is part of the Trans-Canada Trail's Niagara branch, linking to the Caledonia-to-Dunnville rail trail. The majority of the route has already been laid out, with completion work proceeding as funding permits.

Beginning at the top of the Niagara Escarpment (Mud St., just east of Albion Falls at the eastern end of Mountain Brow Rd.), this urban trail winds down the escarpment, running northeast through the Red Hill Valley to its end at Brampton St. just south of the QEW, where the newly completed Waterfront Link Pedestrian Bridge arcs above the highway and connects the Red Hill Valley Trail to the Waterfront Trail and Lake Ontario. Approximately 10.5 km long by 3 metres wide, it includes a 1.1 km-long barrierfree section that is accessible from Greenhill Bowl through Kings Forest Golf Course. (Most of the trail is not wheelchair accessible due to steep grades.)

### The Bruce Trail

Canada's oldest and longest marked trail, running along the Niagara Escarpment, the Bruce Trail provides an impressive wilderness experience for hikers of all levels. Recognized by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) as a World Biosphere Reserve in 1990, its continuous footpath of more than 885 km from Niagara to Tobermory is an attraction for hikers from across the globe. Hamilton's Iroquoia tract, one of the most scenic stretches of the Bruce Trail, snakes through conservation areas, the lush Escarpment and picturesque waterfalls, including Webster's, Sherman and Tiffany. Hikers venture through natural wonders such as the Devil's Punch Bowl and Spencer Gorge. Indigenous wildlife of the region is often seen along the trail. In winter, the trail is a popular place for cross-country skiing and snowshoeing. Located at the arboretum area of the Royal Botanical Gardens, off Old Guelph Road, the Bruce Trail Association (BTA) offers a trail guidebook. To obtain memberships, maps or friendly advice, visit the BTA weekdays 8:30am-4:30pm.

### Trans-Canada Trail

The local section of this cross-country trail encompasses 70 km of pathways and converted rail corridors across Hamilton. Connections from the west start at the Hamilton-to-Brantford rail trail, linking to the Escarpment rail trail, a proposed route through the city, and the Chippewa Trail to the east have all been registered as part of the Trans-Canada route. When completed, the Trans-Canada Trail (TCT) will traverse every province and territory, touch the three oceans bordering Canada and, at over 22,500 km, become the longest shared-use trail in the world. The TCT accommodates several activities, including cycling, horseback riding and cross-country skiing.

### Royal Botanical Gardens

A perennial favourite of horticulturists, RBG is Canada's largest botanical garden. It encompasses a plenitude of gardens, nature sanctuaries and over 30 km of walking trails. Enjoy acres of meticulously landscaped gardens, featuring thousands of bulbs, irises, rose bushes, a vast lilac collection and New World orchids. A recent renovation of the Gardens established the sun-drenched Camilla and Peter Dalglish Atrium as well as the Helen M. Kippax Wild Plant Garden, a one-acre tract that's home to more than 14,500 plants. Tulips show in April and early May, lilacs in the second half of May. Visit in June for the Rose Celebration (Hendrie Park Gardens). Call or visit website for full event listings and admission rates. A gift shop and dining are available on-site.

### **Hamilton Harbourfront Parks**

As a port city, Hamilton has an abundance of har-

bourfront parks, including Bayfront, Pier 4 and Pier 8. Bordering the shores of Lake Ontario, these harbourfront parks provide easy access to aquatic entertainment of all varieties. A six-metre-wide asphalt path along **Bayfront Park** (enter off Bay St. N. at Harbourfront Drive) is perfect for rollerblading, walking or biking, while a gravel path stretches across the shoreline for a closer stroll along the bay. A public boat launch is free to visitors. **Pier 4 Park** (enter at Bay St. N. at Guise St.) boasts a waterplay area, boardwalk and a wheelchair access ramp. Access to Harbour West Marina, a prime location for sailing in the harbour, is available via **Pier 8 Park** (off Guise St.). All three parks have beaches, free parking and public washrooms (limited hours).

northwestern shoreline. The *HHQ* docks off Guise St. E., just north of Williams Fresh Café. Also launching from the dock is the 28-foot *Hamiltonian*, taking a dozen passengers on an intimate and informative 50-minute tour of the harbour. Circling the harbour in counter-clockwise loops, the boat guides passengers past lush wildlife, teeming marinas and the waterfront's history. The *Hamiltonian* departs regularly from 11am-6:30pm and operates daily Jun 9-Sep 3 and on weekends only May 19-Jun 3 and Sep 8-Oct 8. Tickets via Scoops Ice Cream Parlour. The *Hamiltonian* may not operate during inclement weather.

While ice climbing has yet to reach its full potential elsewhere in Ontario, this exciting winter sport has been practiced on frozen crags at Hamilton Conservation Authority (HCA) parks for more than 25 years. Balmy winters and suburban salt runoff have made this a risky and problematic enterprise in recent years, but conquering an icy ascent in the

snowbound wilderness is a feat many still look to attempt. Ice climbing is currently limited to Tiffany Falls Conservation Area and Tews Falls in the Spencer Gorge/Webster's Falls Conservation Area. (Note: ice climbing is prohibited at Webster's Falls.) Individual climbers must be members of the Alpine Club of Canada or be attending an ice climbing class with a school that has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the HCA. Signed release of liability waivers are mandatory before climbing; each waiver also requires a \$35 processing fee (plus HST).



Also in the cheap and cheerful category is the Big Top Family Restaurant, a beacon of greasy goodness for 60 years at Main and Sherman. The decor and old-menu may seem frozen in time, but that's the way its patrons like it.

Since 1969, Black Forest Inn has dished out German and Austrian specialties, including schnitzels so big they dwarf the plates they're served on. Having to make the choice between these and the homemade sausages is a 'wurstcase' scenario all diners must face.

At Shakespeare's, everyone from Liberace to Martin Short has waltzed through the doors in search of beef and seafood for 43 years. It's still owned and operated by the Putignano family and remains the go-to restaurant for special occasions.

Capri Ristorante Italiano circa 1960 has changed with the times, but its pizzas remain objects of desire. Pasta dishes swim in homemade meat sauce and may cause rampant belt-loosening.

#### **Arts & Drafts**


Although Hamilton's breweries have not lasted, many of the area's beer establishments have.

The Collins Brewhouse in Dundas has poured pints since 1841, decades before Canada became a country. Meanwhile in Ancaster, The Coach & Lantern Pub traces the roots of its home to 1823.

Across from the Gore Park fountain, Chester's Beers of the World caters to drinkers wanting to taste global beers without the travel. The list of offerings is lengthy, but the knowledgeable servers deftly guide customers through it.

Also downtown is The Ship, which bills itself as Hamilton's first "nano" brewery. Its own brew, The Ships Rations, is a 6.5 percent high-octane IPA.

Crafty types like the Winking Judge in Hess Village; with 22 beer taps in operation, sippers never experience lack of choice.

Restaurants are a lot like movies. Critics, and crowds, love 'em or hate 'em. These eateries are superstars in their own right, earning glowing reviews!

Quatrefoil in Dundas is a blockbuster based on the rave reviews. Dishes flow out of the kitchen like a well-paced tango. Delicately flavoured appetizers include grilled calamari and ricotta gnocchi.

One of the top-rated eateries amongst the dining public is Rapscallion, whose menu focuses on

dishes with a dash of decadence, such as foie gras-stuffed meatballs and mini filet mignon sliders.

It's not just the location that has won Sarcoa raves. Overlooking Pier 8, diners can gaze at sailboats out on the water while nibbling on Ontario-centric fare. Local, fresh and homemade are the key words here.

Stoney Creek's Edgewater Manor is housed in a 1920s mansion. In such a luxe setting, the food has to match, and it does. International flavours meet Canadian sensibility in entrees like pan-seared tuna and Australian rack of lamb.




#### **Grape Expectations**

Tiptoe through the vineyards in Niagara and sip your way through the region's wineries, more than 80 in total. Hamilton is a perfect gateway into wine land, given its proximity. Within a half-hour's drive, you'll be nose-to-glass in some exquisite varietals. There's no doubt that Icewine is the jewel in the crown here, but others are now emerging as worthy opponents for top billing. The terroir (or dirt, as regular folks might say), Niagara Escarpment and the cooling winds off the lake create growing conditions that make grapes, and winemakers, very happy.

Given Hamilton's proximity to the Niagara region, it's not surprising that the area boasts two wineries of its own. Ridge Road Estate Winery, *ridgeroadwinery.ca*, has won accolades for its Gamay Noir and Pinot Noir, two reds pleasing to diverse palates. At Puddicombe Estate, *puddicombefarms.com*, it's all about the fruit. Their playful fruit-based wines go great with slices of their amazing pie.



In the city that gave the world its first Tim Hortons, you can bet that coffee is much revered. At Speakeasy Café on Ferguson Avenue North, you can savour Kochere Gayo, a house blend judged at an international food show as being the best in the world. At Red Crow Coffee on James Street South, cups of locally roasted and micro-bean varieties are poured with pride. In Dundas, staff members from Detour Roasters Café compete for national acclaim as the best barista and have the ability to describe coffee nuances like fine wine. Watch for places like The Freeway or Connections Café offering pours from Red Hill Coffee Trade, Hamilton's own roaster of artisan java, free trade and organic beans.



### **Around the World**

Don't look now, but there's a definite buzz around Hamilton's burgeoning culinary scene, whether it be the appearance of local eateries on the Food Network's popular You Gotta Eat Here or the continued emergence of quality restos in the core. So really, there's no excuse not to partake of the top quality food and drink on our doorstep.

# Design Annex

Part gallery, part event venue, part arts incubator and part lifestyle boutique, the AGH Design Annex not only expands the Gallery's presence along James Street North, but adds some welcome mainstream muscle to the grassroots arts scene that has been transforming the area.

The Design Annex is housed in the former Dominion Furniture building, a heritage property that was bought and restored by

local partners Doug McKerlie, Bill Curran and Tim Potocic. The trio returned 118 James North to its former glory and the space is a beguiling — and eclectic — mix of urban decor, all exposed brick, original tin ceilings and hardwood floors. The art and design store features one-of-a-kind furniture, lighting, accessories and artwork from local, Canadian and international artists, artisans and designers. This latter feature of the area is constantly evolving yet is an undeniable presence, and there is no better way to inhale the artsy air than the Art Crawl that takes place on

the second Friday of each month. A self-guided tour, revellers explore the many studios, shops and spaces that inject an irresistible ideology into the area - art is fun. A staple of the evening, make sure to crawl aboard the Art Bus, departing from The Pearl Company, thepearlcompany.ca. A guide takes you to top galleries for openings and meetings with artists, where you can learn about their work and hang out with other art enthusiasts. After-crawl bonus: awesome food and drink venues abound in this area!

#### Art in the City

In case you hadn't heard, Hamilton has a new steel - art. The city is experiencing something of a cultural renaissance with its burgeoning art scene, slowly becoming the backbone of Hamilton. With a thriving art community on James St. North — marked by an influx of independent artists from Toronto and beyond - culture and art in Hamilton is alive and well. From the artist-run centre Hamilton Artist Inc. to the recently opened Manta Contemporary and the Nathaniel Hughson Gallery, there is a plethora of local art to admire and purchase. If you can't walk, maybe you can crawl. The



In the golden days of movies - the 1930s and 1940s -Hamilton's movie-going public was served by more than 20 motion picture theatres. The city boasted six major palaces downtown and 15 neighbourhood or "second run" theatres scattered across the lower city, ranging in size from small (400 seats) to large (2,000 seats and up). Before the advent of television, they were a popular diversion, and hard times saw movie-goers escape indoors to watch the hapless rich in romantic comedies, westerns and crime dramas — happy their financial woes were nothing compared to Hollywood's celluloid versions. Most theatres had been designed and built in the previous decade, principally as venues for vaudeville and burlesque, with movies as an afterthought - a decent sound system being unimportant. Almost all went through major upgrades and restoration, sometimes more than once, and by 1930, all of the vaudeville and burlesque theatres had been converted to movie houses. An Art Deco-era neighbourhood movie house, the historic Westdale Theatre is unique in that it is Hamilton's only theatre constructed in that era that has continually functioned as a cinema to this day. The last free-standing movie house in the city, the 593-seat Westdale shows a mix of top-tier current releases, art house fare, independent and foreign films, and its stately and subdued interior will send you back in time to a period when popular entertainment was a far more genteel proposition.

Come out to the city's east end for a big movie experience at a fraction of the price of regular theatres. The Startop Theatre (#1) boasts a screen size of 47 feet by 95 feet, roughly the size of an IMAX screen. The Atomic Theatre (#2) and the new Galaxy Theatre (#3) are both 30 feet by 60 feet, much larger than the average indoor theatre screen. A vintage diner, located in the Startop Theatre, features classic items such as pogos, hamburgers, hot dogs and chicken fingers. Up until showtime, kids can play on such timeless playground pieces as a roundabout and the spring horses for little ones. Car Load Thursdays invite visitors to cram in showgoers for a \$15 flat rate per car.
